






Extra! Extra! Read All About It! The humorous tale, El Deafo, recently earned a prestigious Newbery Honor for outstanding contribution to children's literature!!

- Writer and illustrator Cece Bell has been creating children's books for over a decade, but in her latest, she finally turns to her own story — about growing up hearing-impaired, after meningitis left her "severely to profoundly deaf" at the age of 4.
- The book, a mix of memoir, graphic novel and children's book, is called *El Deafo*. It's a funny, unsentimental tale that follows Cece from age 4 through elementary school, as she transforms from mild-mannered little girl into full-fledged superhero—the "El Deafo" of the title.
- Going to school and making new friends can be tough. But going to school and making new friends while wearing a bulky hearing aid strapped to your chest? That requires superpowers! In this funny, poignant graphic novel memoir, author/illustrator Cece Bell chronicles her hearing loss at a young age and her subsequent experiences with the Phonic Ear, a very powerful—and very awkward—hearing aid.
- "Even though in the book, it seems like at the end of the book that I'm totally cool with it, with having trouble hearing it took me much, much longer in my life to get to that point," she says. "But suddenly I was ready so then I did it. And I'm kind of glad I waited, because I got a lot more experience as a storyteller with these other books, and I think that made me better ready to do it now." Cece
- As the District Teacher of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing, I'm always looking for literature that my hearing impaired students can directly identify with. This story hit a home run!!! Please check it out!

I remember working with Cece in first grade at Academy Street School in Salem in the mid 1970s. She was absolutely delightful! My favorite memory of her was when I read aloud to the class. She always got in my lap. No one else ever sat in my lap; they assumed it was reserved for Cece. That Christmas she gave me a Christmas themed plate. I still use it every year at Christmas for cookies.

At Whiton we love to learn and want students to feel the same way. When students are enthusiastic and have a good attitude, learning comes easier and can be lots of fun. One way we do this is through wall decorations in the hallway.

The April wall display outside Ms. Sherbin's room is math, math, and more math! The math word alphabet expands over both walls. Numbers, fractions, graphs, measurement, geometry, and math strategies are just some of the math areas covered. Classes have taken "field trips" to visit the math wall.

As part of our second grade science curriculum we study Painted Lady Butterflies. Our Painted Lady Caterpillars arrived on April 15, 2015. When they first got here each child got about 3 to 4 caterpillars. Each child was given a tiny plastic container with holes, a piece of tissue paper, some mallow for the caterpillars to eat and their caterpillars. The students are responsible for taking measurements of their caterpillars daily and making observations on a regular basis. Prior to the caterpillars forming their chrysalises we transfer them into a Butterfly House so they can make their chrysalises at the top of the house and have more room. They will remain in this stage for about 2 weeks before emerging as butterflies. The students love studying the caterpillars and have enjoyed watching them grow and shed their skin. They are eagerly looking forward to seeing the chrysalises form and eventually butterflies emerge.
