It has been wonderful to see the enthusiasm and pride that the children have for their garden.



Diary of a Butterfly By Mrs. Zelnick & Mrs. Piano

The butterflies have emerged! Our unit on the butterfly life cycle started a month ago. When we received the caterpillars, they were so tiny. They were barely one centimeter each. I told the students that the caterpillars would become adults (butterflies) in only one month, much quicker than people. They observed the caterpillars as they ate the mallow plant and grew too big for the little plastic cups that they were living in. In just a couple of weeks, the caterpillars had crawled to the top of the net to get ready for the next stage, the chrysalis. Days and days passed. Other classes had butterflies. ("Uh, oh," I thought.) Then this Monday, we came in to find butterflies in the net. (Phew!) The students were so excited. To culminate the butterfly experience, the students are going to write a book about the butterfly life cycle. The books will be written from the butterfly's perspective, just like the Diary of a Worm and Diary of a Wimpy Kid series. Mrs. Cashin suggested we title the books, Diary of a Butterfly. The students are doing a great job writing and publishing their books. Keep an eye out for the books to appear on display in the library.

Grade 1- Chemical Engineering- Students are learning about what chemical engineers do. They are also learning about the Engineering Design Process. (Ask, Imagine, Plan, Create, and Improve). The students imagined that they were chemical engineers and used this process to design a new raspberry-orange juice color for a fictitious company called, "The Creative Juice Company". The children had the opportunity to complete a product research survey and made recommendations on their products results. The students also made and experimented with different ingredients to make a high quality Play- Doh. The students had great fun learning about how solids and liquids can be combined in a certain way to make great dough product.



Grade 2: Ancient China: Students have been busy studying ancient China. Students learned about the Great Wall of China and why it was built. They learned about the geography of China and all the things that were invented throughout the different dynasties. Students read facts about China and created items from the Chinese culture like fancy paper cutouts and fans. Students practiced writing in Chinese and counting 1-10. They also read about ancient China in the *Appleseeds* publication called, Children of China Long Ago. Students also read a story about a girl from Beijing who dreamed about being a materials engineer and building a wall around her garden. Next, the students will learn about what a material engineer does and experiment with different mortars to try to build a mini wall of their own. The students clearly love learning about material engineering and how the rich Chinese culture has influenced our lives.

Grade 3 – The People Puzzle Project- Hooray for the 3rd and 5th grade GATE classes. They have had the opportunity to work together and collaborate on an exciting research project. The 3rd grade GATE students began the project by creating an original "People Puzzle" where they had to think of and create clues and artifacts from a famous person's life. They worked hard in class to think of original ways to present their clues. The clues and artifacts were then sent to Mrs. Burke's 5th grade class to decode. The 5th graders worked like CSI agent's genealogists, and historical researchers, carefully examining the clues to find the meaning behind them. Once the 5th grade GATE students figured out who the famous person was, they wrote a letter back to the 3rd grade GATE class about the results of their findings. The 3rd graders really enjoyed working on this research project knowing that their hard work paid off and had value. They also looked forward to receiving positive feedback from the older children. The students in both schools really enjoyed participating in this type of student research and vertical articulation project.

- Do you know what multisensory reading instruction is?
- Multisensory reading instruction is one important aspect of instruction for a student who struggles with decoding and encoding words. Instruction is explicit, direct, cumulative, intensive, and focused on the structure of language. Students are taught the structure of written language, including the sounds (phonemes), meaning units (morphemes such as prefixes, suffixes, and roots) and common spelling rules. Multisensory learning involves the use of visual, auditory, and kinesthetic-tactile pathways simultaneously to enhance memory and learning of written language. Links are consistently made between the visual (*language we see*), auditory (*language we hear*), and kinesthetic-tactile (*language symbols we feel*) pathways in learning to read and spell.
- Tell me and I'll forget. Show me, and I may not remember. Involve me, and I'll understand.


