

Theme: "Reading is Paw-some"

Day	Event	Description
Monday 2/29/16	Readers' Oath	We will kick off Read Across America Week with an announcement in the morning. During the announcement, the Readers' Oath will be recited. Students will sign the "Readers' Oath" to pledge their love for reading.
Monday 2/29/16	Read Aloud: What Pet Should I Get?	Students will listen to read aloud of the book What Pet Should I Get?
Tuesday 3/1/16	Favorite Book Hallway Display	Students will share their favorite book (through drawing and/or writing) on their pet template. Kindergarten: Bird/Owl "Reading is a Hoot" First: Dog "Paws-itively Great Readers" Second: Cat "Reading is Purrr-fect" Third: Fish "Hooked on Reading"
Wednesday 3/2/16	Buddy Reading	Classes will be paired up and older students will read with younger students.
Thursday 3/3/16	Favorite Pet Graph	Each class will mark their vote for favorite pet on the School Graph.
Friday 3/4/16		Everyone at Whiton will be "jumping aboard the reading train." We will create a train of silent readers sitting along the walls of the hallway.
Friday 3/4/16	Read Across America Assembly	Students will participate in an assembly.

3rd Grade SOUPer Bowl



When you think of the Super Bowl, you probably think of football, but you should think of SOUP! Between Feb 1 and 5, Whiton 3rd graders hosted a soup collection benefitting a local food bank. Students were encouraged to bring in cans of soup to vote for the team they wanted to win the Super Bowl. The Whiton SOUPer Bowl was a close contest. In the end, the Broncos topped the Panthers, and we were able to collect over 300 cans! In the words of a wise 3rd grader, "It doesn't really matter about the Super Bowl. It matters about the SOUPer Bowl and that we collected food for other people."

SCHOOL COUNSELOR'S CORNER 8 STEPS FOR CREATING BETTER BEHAVIOR:

Strategies for Parents

Step 1: Learn to pay positive attention to your child

- The attention you give to your child is a very positive reward or consequence
- In the absence of positive attention, negative attention may seem a worthwhile pursuit to a child
- Be specific and avoid "backhanded" compliments

Step 2: Use your attention to gain compliance

- Immediately following a command, provide feedback
- Don't give multiple commands
- "Catch" your child being good! And praise their actions

Step 3: Give more effective commands

- Use effective communication strategies
- Present commands as a statement, not a question(Do you think it's time for a bath?"
- Try to give commands one at a time
- Get your child's attention (have them look at you)
- Reduce distractions
- Ask your child to repeat the command
- Set timelines/deadlines (a kitchen timer can be helpful!)

SCHOOL COUNSELOR'S CORNER Continued

Step 4: Teach your child not to interrupt your activities

- Provide a two-part command
 - a. Tell your child what to do while you are busy
 - b. Tell your child not to interrupt or bother you
- Praise your child's compliance

Step 5: Set up a home token system

- Chip/marble/pom-pom program
- Home point system
- Creative options

Step 6: *Learn to discipline misbehavior effectively and constructively

- Note that your child's refusal to obey can be reduced significantly by using a behavioral approach.

Step 7: Expand your use of "time out"

- Use to address more behaviors

Step 8: Learn to manage your child in public places

- Plan ahead; determine the rules and review beforehand with your child
- Determine an incentive for compliance and the punishment for noncompliance
- Assign an activity
- Remember that timing is critical!




SOCIAL THINKING®


In October, I had the opportunity to attend a workshop in Mt. Laurel, NJ called SOCIAL THINKING®, founded by Michelle Garcia Winner, MA, CCC. Social Thinking® is the ability to consider your own and others' thoughts, emotions, beliefs, intentions, knowledge, etc. to help interpret and respond to the information in your mind and possibly through your social behavioral interactions. A person who exhibits good social skills is able to adapt his/her behavior effectively based on the situation and what they know about the people in the situation in hopes that people will react and respond to him/her in the manner he/she had hoped. The knowledge that I gained from learning about Social Thinking® is now being infused into my speech and language lessons when necessary. Michelle Garcia Winner published curricula, materials and storybooks. Each storybook teaches various concepts. For example, the first story book in The Incredible Flexible You Curriculum is called Thinking Thoughts and Feeling Feelings. Students are exposed to concepts about thoughts and feelings as well as basic information about the brain and the heart. For example, the brain's job is to think and make thoughts and our heart is where we keep our feelings. Thinking thoughts creates feelings. The thought bubble represents thoughts. The Whole Body Listening poster is a valuable teaching tool as it us used to teach children to listen with their whole body. 


Bucket Filling




Motion and Design Science Unit



Our class worked hard on our science unit Motion and Design. The students worked with K'nex, which are like building blocks to build cars and test their stability and distance. We tested cars in the hallway to see how far and fast they would go, but their final challenge was the most fun.



The final design challenge included a challenge card given to each group with specifics about what their car had to include, as well as a price list for the parts to include in a final cost for the car.
